


Extension activity for SUSAN LAUGHS: Help – Giving and Getting

Materials:

- Copy of Susan Laughs
- Printed copies of the key words discussed during the Cromwell Center program. See last page of this document for list of words that you can print.
- 1. Remind students of The Cromwell Center's visit and the discussion about "What is a disability?"
- 2. Begin by showing students the last page of *Susan Laughs*. Remind students that Susan has a **disability** because her legs work **differently** and she has **difficulty** walking. She gets **help** moving around by using her wheelchair, but Susan has the **ability** to do lots of things!
- 3. Reread Susan Laughs.
- 4. Discuss activities that Susan might need help doing and those that she can do all by herself.
 - a. How do you feel when you need help doing something like riding a bike, swimming, reaching for something, reading, etc.?
 - b. When you are learning something new, do you like to try and do it yourself? Why?
 - c. How do you feel when you can finally do it? (proud, happy, etc.)
 - d. Are there times when you need extra help? Is it okay to ask for help?
 - e. Do you like it when someone just comes in and does it for you when you have not asked them to? Why?
 - f. Would you rather be able to ASK for help?
 - g. Can YOU help others?
 - h. Do you think Susan likes to do things for herself, just like you?
 - i. Do you think Susan might need extra help doing some things, just like you?
 - j. Do you think Susan feels the same feelings you do about getting or needing help?
 - k. What if Susan was really good at (reading, writing, spelling, throwing a ball, etc.)? Could she help someone who was having a hard time (reading, writing, spelling, throwing a ball, etc.)?
 - I. How do you think that would make her feel?
 - m. If Susan were your friend, what fun thing would you like to do with her? How could you help her or she could help you?
- 5. Have students draw pictures and write about what they would like to do with Susan and how they would both feel. These pictures can be stapled together to create *Susan Laughs, Two,* a new class book.
